Trial Period Policy

Early Years (Seedlings and Kindergarten)

Every pupil who joins the School begins with a term's Trial Period (which is defined as one school calendar term—or the equivalent if a child joins in the middle of a term) although parents and the School have the right to curtail the Trial at any time (see below). Towards the end of the period, The College of Teachers will review each pupil's Trial. College might decide to pass the Trial, extend the Trial with recommendations, or fail the trial. The following criteria will be used to inform the review. This list is intended as a guide for new pupils and their parents.

- 1. Social integration into the Class or Group is important and it is expected that new pupils endeavour to find their place in the Class or Group.
- 2. The pupil is co-operative with teachers.
- 3. The attendance record should be fully satisfactory in accordance with the attendance policy and there should not be any unaccounted, excessive or unauthorised absences from school (either full or part day or missed lessons). Parents must follow the procedures set out in the 'attendance policy'.
- 4. Parents are expected to familiarise themselves with School Rules and keep to them. Parents are expected to ensure pupils' compliance.
- 5. Pupils in Seedlings and Kindergarten work with a 'settling in' document throughout their first term. This tracks the child's progress and will inform the Trial Period.
- 6. The School reserves the right to curtail the Trial Period at any time in situations where there is a substantial breakdown of co-operation with the above points, or if it becomes clear that a child is not flourishing either socially or developmentally. Parents will be informed before the end of the period in cases where a child is not meeting the criteria and is therefore unlikely to pass their Trial.
- 7. Parents are expected to support the ethos of the School.
- 8. Parents must cooperate with the School on matters of wellbeing and safeguarding.

- 9. Parents are advised to share all information pertinent to their child's education and development, both in and out of school, in a timely manner. This is necessary to support the teaching of the child within the Class.
- 10. Parents will be kept informed of any concerns teachers might have about a child's progress against the above criteria and a conversation will be offered. If there are concerns, The College of Teachers has discretion to extend the Trial following review and recommendations will be made to address those concerns.

Lower School

Every pupil who joins the School begins with a term's Trial Period (which is defined as one school calendar term—or the equivalent if a child joins in the middle of a term), although parents and the School have the right to curtail the Trial at any time (see below). - 5. Parents and pupils are expected to familiarise themselves with School Rules and keep to them. Parents are expected to ensure pupils' compliance.
- 6. The School reserves the right to curtail the Trial Period at any time in situations where there is a substantial breakdown of co-operation with the above points, or if it becomes clear that a child is not flourishing either socially or academically.
